

2014 Semi-Annual Report





On behalf of the hard working men and women of the Yucaipa Police Department, it is my pleasure to present to you the 2014 Mid-Year Report.

In response to the unique challenges presented by Assembly Bill 109, we have utilized state funding to conduct both saturation patrols and regional sweeps. These sweeps are designed to ensure individuals who have been released from custody due to the mandates of AB-109 are in compliance with their release terms.

The Sheriff's Office has established a Homeless Outreach Proactive Enforcement Team "H.O.P.E" to assist the homeless in our county. The H.O.P.E. Team consists of specially trained deputies and officials from the Department of Behavioral Health and is designed to assist the homeless in obtaining food, hygiene items, as well as immediate housing or even long term housing. The Yucaipa Police Department has designated a sergeant and two deputies to work with the H.O.P.E. Team in the City of Yucaipa.


During the first 6-months of this year, we have seen a reduction in Part I Crime by 7% and a reduction in Part II Crime by 8%. Our non-injury traffic injuries have been reduced by 6% and our injury-traffic collisions have been reduced by 14%. Additionally, response times to priority calls continue to drop and have been reduced by another second falling from 5:43 to 5:42.

On July 1st we opened our new police department to the public. The state of the art technology that is incorporated into the building will act as a force multiplier that will ensure the well deserving citizens of our valley have exceptional law enforcement services. The employees are very appreciative and love their new home!

Our goals of providing efficient, professional, proactive police services remain as strong as ever. With the support of our City Council and City Manager Ray Casey, we will continue with our commitment to keep Yucaipa as one of the safest communities in the Inland Empire.

NOTEWORTHY EVENTS

CRIME TRENDS

During the first 6-months of this year, we have seen a major reduction in crime. With the exception of two murders which resulted in a 200% increase in our Homicide Rate, every significant crime category reflects that crime in our city is on a downward trend. Robbery is down by 68%, Aggravated Assaults are down by 50%, Rape is down by 33% and Simple Assaults are down by 21%. Although, like many cities, we have seen a slight increase in Burglaries (6%) and Larceny (4%), primarily due to AB-109 releases, Auto Theft has been reduced by 27% and Arson has been reduced by 38%.

SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

In honor of Detective Jeremiah MacKay who was killed in the line of duty last year, a portion of Hwy 38 near Glass Road was dedicated to Jeremiah MacKay. In May, Jeremiah's name was added to the Peace Officer Memorial in both Sacramento and Washington DC. Sheriff John McMahon along with Captain Hamblin accompanied Jeremiah's wife, Lynette and her family to both ceremonies. In June, this city renamed 6th Street north of Yucaipa Boulevard to Detective Jeremiah MacKay Way. We will be forever grateful to this City Council, and the wonderful citizens of Yucaipa for their incredible display of support in honoring our fallen hero. He shall never be forgotten.

INVESTIGATIONS

Throughout the first months of this year, the Yucaipa Police Department conducted twenty-two state funded AB-109 programs and two PC 290 (Sexual Registrants) compliance checks. As a result of these operations, 450 subjects were contacted and 60 subjects were arrested.

In March, a 70 year old male, was smothered to death. A 66 year old female was immediately arrested and charged with PC 187, Murder.

In April, a 47 year old male was killed while coming to the aid of another victim who had been robbed of her purse. A 27 year old male was immediately arrested and charged with PC 187, Murder.

In April, a 16 year old male student at Yucaipa High School disclosed that he was sexually abused by his female teacher. After a thorough investigation, A 44 year old teacher from Yucaipa High School was arrested and charged with PC 261.5(c), Unlawful Sexual Intercourse with a minor.

In June we hosted a regional SMASH Sweep that resulted in the arrest of 46 subjects.

TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT

Our traffic unit has done an outstanding job of ensuring the safety of our motoring public. During the first 6 months of this year, they have conducted 3 DUI checkpoints. These checkpoints are funded through the Office of Traffic and Safety and are designed to educate the public about the dangers of driving while impaired.

Though the first 6 months of the year we have seen a decrease in non-injury traffic accidents by 6% and a decrease in injury traffic accidents by 14% over the same period last year.

Fatal accidents have been reduced by 50%. The lone fatality occurred in May when a 59 year old pedestrian, was hit and killed while crossing Yucaipa Boulevard in the late evening hours between 4th and 5th Street. The driver of the vehicle was not cited.

In April, our traffic officers presented a motorcycle safety course for the public. The presentation emphasized education and good riding habits. Our motor officers set up a course for the students to practice what they had been shown in the class. The instructors emphasized the importance of practicing safe riding techniques in a controlled environment before taking it to the city streets.

In April, we conducted our 22nd annual city sponsored bicycle rodeo at the Yucaipa Community Park. With the support of the Kiwanis Club and numerous local businesses, three brand new bicycles, hundreds of bicycle helmets, and toys were given away to the nearly 300 children. This annual event is used to teach children and their parents about bicycle safety equipment and how traffic laws apply to bicyclist.

The police department uses this annual event as a time to bond with the community it serves and brings out several static displays. This year's displays included a helicopter, search and rescue team members with their equipment and with posse members and their horses.

Our traffic unit plans to continue to educate the citizens of Yucaipa through the local media, and enforcement contacts. With this continued education, we believe, we will continue to improve traffic safety for all of our citizens.

VOLUNTEERS

The level of service our police volunteers provide to the City of Yucaipa is exemplary. Our volunteers consist of explorers who range in age from 14 to 21 years of age along with our line reserves and citizen volunteers who do not have an age limit. These outstanding citizens are always there when we need them. During the first 6 months of this year, they donated over 20,000 hours of service. This is an increase of over 7,000 hours when compared to last year. Truly amazing!!



CRIME STATS


The F.B.I classifies crimes into two basic classifications or groups. Part I Crimes consist of the more serious offenses and include murder and rape. Part II Crimes are generally regarded as less serious and include all crimes not listed as Part I Crimes.

During the first 6-months of this year, we have seen a significant reduction in almost every major crime category. With the exception of two murders, which resulted in a 200% increase in our Homicide Rate, every significant crime category reflects that crime in our city is on a downward trend. Robbery is down by 68%, Aggravated Assaults are down by 50%, Rape is down by 33% and Simple Assaults are down by 21%. 


Response Times




Comparison Part I Part II Crimes



Crimes Against Property




Crimes Against Persons










Traffic Citations




Traffic Collisions




Non-Injury Traffic Collisions




Injury Traffic Collisions
